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Course Objectives:

World Regional Geography focuses upon the ideas, concepts, and models of regional geography to study the major realms and regions of the world. This course has two basic but interrelated objectives: to familiarize students with the diversity of people and places in the world, and to introduce students to the diverse world of geography. We will use a spatial approach to bridge the study of and interactions between human societies and natural environments. This course is designed to help you master factual information and concepts and apply these to analyzing regional landscapes and understanding current world issues in their spatial and cultural contexts. Critical thinking about the world around you is stressed.

Students are encouraged to pay close attention to events happening around the world, to watch daily news programs (i.e., PBS and BBC), to read newspapers and newsmagazines, and to use web sites (i.e., www.cnn.com) as relevant global news sources. Class time will be used to discuss major world events as they occur.

World Regional Geography satisfies the General Education Requirement (GER) in Social Sciences and World Cultures designation. This course addresses three UND GER goals: (1) Think critically and creatively; (2) Understand how conclusions are reached in the social sciences; and, (3) Develop some familiarity with cultures other than their own.

Upon completing this course ...

- Students will gain an understanding of selected key terms, concepts, principles, and models of geography at several scales of geographic inquiry.
- Students will go beyond just <u>what is where</u> to understanding <u>why</u> things are as they are. Geographic awareness and knowledge means examining and understanding the spatial patterns and processes found in the major regions of the world.
- Students will acquire the necessary geographic foundations to build an informed view of global current events.

This course relates to the following goals of the UND Department of Geography ...

- Goal 1: Students will gain an understanding of the world in spatial terms.
- Goal 2: Students will develop an appreciation of the fundamental themes and processes of human geography.
- Goal 3: Students will gain an understanding of the analytical tools used to investigate and solve spatial problems.
- Goal 4: Students will become better citizens over the course of their lives by developing a global, regional, and local perspective on human and environmental issues.

A current world atlas with both cultural and physical features is recommended.
